Pearce is a California native who grew up on the East Coast. With previous experience in orthopedics, he has spent the last decade serving as a physician assistant in cardiothoracic surgery and emergency medicine. "Going vertical" has been a life-long pursuit for Pearce. Pearce is a Fellow in the Academy of Wilderness Medicine (WMS) and an Single AMGA Certified Pitch After Instructor (SPI). having completed his Diploma in Mountain Medicine (DiMM), he has continued to provide locums instruction at the University of New Mexico International Mountain Medicine Center. He has served on the board of directors for the Appalachian Center for Wilderness Medicine (ACWM) and has dedicated many years of

service to search and rescue teams across the country.

He is currently the Assistant Medical Director of Portland Mountain Rescue (PMR) and chair of the Rescue Systems Committee. Alongside multiple wilderness medicine publications and his work with the outstanding members of PMR, Pearce serves in the Oregon Air National Guard, 142nd Fighter Wing-CERFP Unit. Pearce is the recipient of the 2017 Warren D. Bowman Award for contributions in service to wilderness medicine and to the Wilderness Medical Society, the 2018 PA-Citizen of the Year Award from the Oregon Medical Association, and the 2019 Founders Award from the Appalachian Center for Wilderness Medicine.



Outside of the hospital, Pearce is involved with church ministry, rowing, cycling, ice climbing, and mountaineering. His greatest adventure and most rewarding pursuit have been enjoying the blessing of his wife, **Heather**, and two children, **Micah** and **Jonah**.

As of **31 July 2023**, the **MOAA Portland Chapter** had overall assets of **\$22,751.15** and a total of **167** members. 100 out of 115 regular members have paid chapter dues for 2023, 6 out of 49 Surviving Spouse members have paid dues for 2023 (but are not required). Three Honorary Members have not paid dues for 2023 (but are not required).

LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE REPORT By LTC Gary Battles, USAR (Ret), Co-Legislative Committee Chair

During the month of August, the Chapter Legislative Committee leadership--along with other chapter volunteers-- will make appointments with our Members of Congress (MOC) or their staff to keep up the momentum on the messages we delivered in April during the annual MOAA "Advocacy-in-Action (AiA)" Campaign on Capitol Hill in Washington, DC.

We will review with our MOC two areas:

1. To urge our MOC to pay full housing costs to service members. Currently, service members who live on base/post get 100% of the Basic Allowance for Subsistence. Service members who live off base/post only get 95% of their BAS. This is a severe loss of income over a career in the military and can have a negative impact on recruitment and retention.

2. To cut costs to the Tricare Pharmacy Network. The Tricare Pharmacy Network was cut nearly 25% this year. This cost cutting creates serious difficulties for those who live in rural areas, the elderly, and individuals with serious or complex medical difficulties.

REPORT ON THE NATIONAL VETERANS' WHEELCHAIR GAMES

• The Department of Veterans Affairs and the Paralyzed Veterans of America hosted the 42nd National Veterans' Wheelchair Games (NVWG) in Portland from July 4-9, 2023.

• The National Veterans Wheelchair Games is a sports and rehabilitation program for military Veterans who use wheelchairs for sports competition due to spinal cord injuries, amputations, or other neurological conditions.

• The Portland VA Medical Center and Oregon PVA (now Tri-State PVA) started this journey in July 2018, when Portland, Oregon was selected to host the 2020 NVWG.

• COVID changed that to a NVWG at Home event, and Portland went back into the que for hosting: 2021 (New York City, NY), 2022 (Tempe, AZ), and 2023 (Portland).

• This was the first time since the 2019 games in Louisville that we were able to hold the Opening/Closing Ceremonies, which included the Parade of Athletes.

• This year we started with 500+ athletes signing up; however, they still had to receive medical clearance to travel. More than 350 actually arrived along with their coaches and families from around the world to compete in the games, the world's largest annual multi-sport wheelchair competition for veterans. Festivities kicked off on July 4 with a festive opening ceremony--and ended with a closing celebration on July 9. • More than 20 Wheelchair Games events: Veterans with similar athletic ability, experience, or age competed in more than 20 events, including: Adaptive e-sports, Adaptive fitness, Air pistol and rifle, Archery, Basketball, Bass Fishing, Boccia, Bowling, Cycling, Disc golf, Field events, Nine-ball, Pickleball, Power soccer, Wheelchair rugby, Slalom, Softball, Swimming, and Table tennis

• The event was held largely at the Oregon Convention Center and four great venues: (1) Portland International Raceway: Handcycling, (2) Mt Hood Community College: Swimming, (3) Oregon Museum of Science and Industry: Motor rally, and (4) Beaverton King Pin Lanes: Bowling

• Through a fantastic recruiting effort among our VSOs and the community, we had a great volunteer turnout:

- 1,129 volunteers, signed up for 2,520 4-hour volunteer
- Served 15,171 volunteer hours
- \$101,000 in-kind donations

• Shout outs:

- OPVA and locally Tri-State PVA were a cosponsor for this event
- MOAA Portland Chapter sponsored the Challenge coins that each of the athletes received
- DAV sponsored breakfast for the athletes and volunteers at the Handcycling event
- DAV also stepped up to provided short notice transportation for a couple of athletes that needed transportation to the medical center and Portland during the week of the games.

REQUEST FOR EVALUATORS FOR VETERAN GRANTS By Brenna Bandstra, ODVA Grants Coordinator/Strategic Partnerships

The 2023 Oregon State Legislature approved \$1,000,000 for the Campus Veteran Resource Center Grant (CVRC Grant) and \$947,556 to continue funding for the Veteran Services Grant (VS Grant) Program. The VS Grant and the CVRC Grant are to each award multiple one-time grants on a competitive basis.

I am sending out this invitation to ask you to consider serving as a volunteer evaluator for one, or both, of these two very important programs, the CVRC Grant or the VS Grant proposal review process. We are looking for professionals and individuals with a background in veteran services. education and/or community social work who will be able to read, evaluate and score the proposals. Training will be provided about how to use the proposal evaluation tool, in advance. I will be available throughout the evaluation period to answer questions about the evaluation process. The CVRC Grant proposals are due to ODVA on September 4, 2023, and the VS Grant proposals are due to ODVA on October 23, 2023. Each proposal will be read and scored in teams of three different evaluators. Proposal review will take 1-2 hours per proposal. Each evaluator will be assigned four to five proposals to review (per program).

This is what the timeline looks like (total commitment estimated as 8-14 hours per program to include training, the application review, questions/answers, and award recommendation discussion(s)):

• All evaluators to attend a 1-hour remote training session, to be conducted using M365 Teams; you will receive a link to the meeting once Brenna receives your **Interest Form.**

- o CVRC Grant Evaluation Training:
 - Thursday, 8/31 from 10:00 am OR
 - Wednesday, 9/6 from 2:00 pm
- o VS Grant Evaluation Training:
 - Tuesday, 10/17 from 10:00 am OR
 - Thursday, 10/26 from 2:00 pm

• **CVRC Grant** –Proposals will be sent out to evaluators 9/8. Evaluators will then have two weeks to complete the evaluations.

o Friday 9/22: Evaluations will be due back to Brenna by 11:59 pm.

o During the week of 9/25: you will take part in a separate remote session(s) to meet with the other evaluators to discuss the proposals. Each session will be $1-1\frac{1}{2}$ hours.

- The 1st session:
 - There will be time to discuss your evaluation and funding recommendations.
 - A "Team Leader" will be selected to participate in the second session and represent the evaluations of your group.
- The 2nd session:
 - Scheduled Monday 10/2 at 2:00 pm.
 - Attended by "Team Leaders" will be to develop a funding recommendation for the ODVA Director,
 - Discuss the amount of funding being requested and the total funds available. This may include reductions to total amounts requested, in order to balance with the total funds available.
 - Prepare a list of recommended awards for final approval by the Director of Veterans Services.

• VS Grant – Proposals will be sent out to evaluators the week of 10/27. Evaluators will then have two weeks to complete the evaluations.

o Friday 11/10: Evaluations will be due back to me by 11:59 pm.

o During the week of 11/13: you will take part in separate remote session(s) to meet with the other evaluators to discuss the proposals. Each session will be 1-1 $\frac{1}{2}$ hours.

• The **1st session**: will be to address the commonalities in the scores of the proposals your team evaluated, and the differences.

• There will be time to discuss your evaluation and funding recommendations.

• A "Team Leader" will be selected to participate in the second session and represent the evaluations of your group.

• The 2nd session:

• Scheduled Monday 11/20 at 2:00 pm. Attended by "Team Leaders" will be to develop a funding recommendation for the ODVA Director.

Discuss the amount of funding being requested in light of the proposal score and the total funds available. This may include reductions to total amounts requested, in order to balance with the total funds available.
Prepare a list of recommended awards for final approval by the Director of Veterans Services.

All evaluators are welcome and have the option to attend the 2nd session meeting for both the CVRC and VS Grants regardless of if they were designated as a "Team Leader."

Should you have any questions, or would like to talk about the work, please do not hesitate to reach out. I look forward to the opportunity of working with you in this important process of grant work at the Oregon Department of Veterans' Affairs.
